President's Message

Welcome to our inaugural newsletter. To start, I would like to thank Teresa Holmes, our Regional Secretary, who in addition to working full time, found the time to be the Newsletter's editor-at-large. Each article brings meaning into what it means to be a member of the IPA.

Looking back, it is hard to believe that three years have passed since Region 6 was reborn, *see Brief History of the Former Region 6 Ottawa / Carleton*, and almost four years since that fateful day in Nov 2014 when I opened an email from Al Welke, then Vice President Central. In his email, Al stated he was looking for volunteers to try and get Region 6 back up and running again. Being semi-retired at the time, I thought I could spare some time and I replied that I would assist whoever was going to try and resurrect the region. To my surprise, I received a membership list of all members in Eastern Ontario in the mail within a week (tag you're it) and the quest began.

After completing a survey of all the members on the list, forty-six members replied that they were in favour of joining a new Region 6 and to make a long story short, Region 6 Ottawa - Eastern Ontario was granted regional status on September 15th, 2015.

Since then, Region 6 has grown to one-hundred members and we continue to grow. Some comparisons from then and now. In 2015 . . .

- our largest age demographic was 70-79 (28%) and that has changed to 50-59 (32%);
 - 26% of our members were still serving in law enforcement versus 42% today;
 - we had only one female member and today we have eleven.; and
- The average length of time in the IPA was 11 years and this has dropped to 7.5 years today.

Numbers and percentages may be interpreted in many different ways but for me, the numbers represent positive growth for Region 6; it means people are hearing about the IPA and I have you, the members, to thank.

If I have learned anything about the IPA in these past few years it is that word of mouth has a much more positive affect on recruitment than advertising.

Here's looking to a great 2019 and beyond.

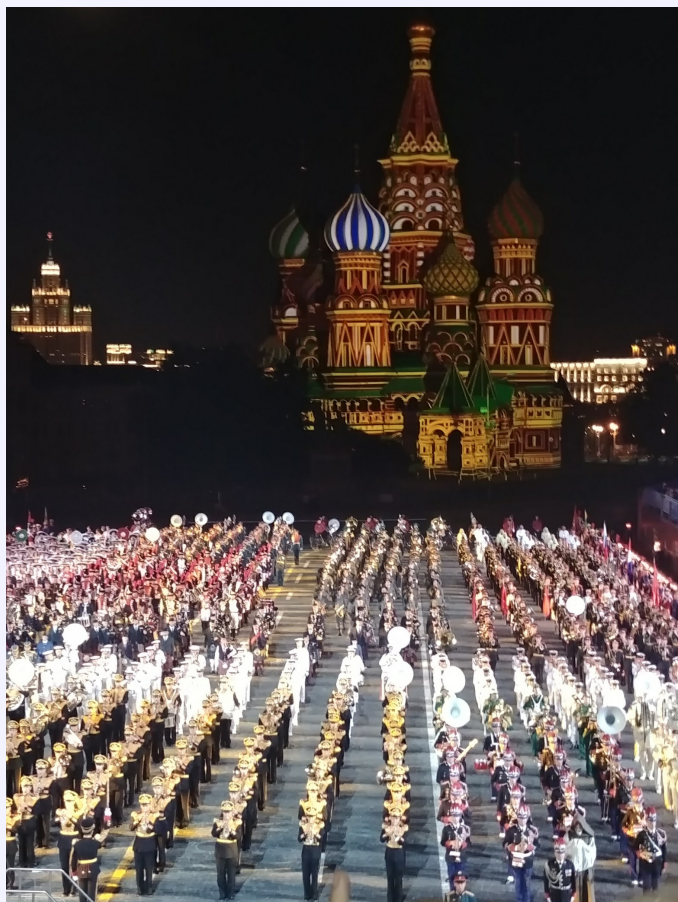

Teresa's Awesome Trip to Russia

Spasskaya Tower in Moscow

IPA Friendship Week 27 Aug – 02 Sep 2018



IPA Region 6 members, Teresa Holmes and Diane Speakman travelled 24+ hours to partake in an incredible and well planned IPA Friendship Week in Moscow.

Members for other IPA National Sections hailed from USA; Brazil; Denmark; Sweden; Spain; Portugal; and Albania.

Friendship Week was just that. Our IPA Motto “SERVO PER AMIKECO” – Service through Friendship. With representation from 8 countries, great and lasting friendships were created.

Our Russian hostesses, Galina and Helena went above and beyond to ensure our week was astounding and eventful. We were certainly well cared for and had great ease travelling throughout the city, whether with the group or venturing out on our own with Moscow's vast metro system and Russian Uber.

Some of the more memorable moments of the week include:

- The Festival Spasskaya Tower (Military Tattoo) in the Red Square: To actually sit in the same stands as Russian Heads of State when they review their military parades was surreal. The sheer numbers of military performers, majesty of each presentation and sold out audience created a magnificent spectacle;

- Stalin's Bunker: An incredible step back in time...

Stalin traveled underground from the Kremlin, Moscow to remain in his bunker, which was a short distance from the German lines during WWII. He would not withdraw and victory became theirs as the Germans retreated after being a mere 17 kms from Moscow. The bunker



has remained unchanged and we were permitted to sit, touch and explore the historical artifacts;

- We visited numerous museums and Russian Orthodox churches which contained numerous



1200 – 1700 century artifacts, most notably the fur and jewelled crowns of Ivan V Alekseyevich, joint Tsar of Russia with his younger half-brother Peter I, who co-reigned between 1682 and 1696. The churches undergoing restoration, still displayed their original glorious artwork on the upper walls

and vaulted dome ceilings;

- We toured a local Police/Emergency Services Water station where our Region 6 banner was exchanged with the police chief and we were granted the opportunity to observe their emergency water rescue and given a boat ride around the lake; and

- Finally, the action-packed week was concluded by the IPA Moscow Week Friendship Gala, where we were introduced to Moscow Region President, Lt-General Sardak Ivan and received IPA Moscow swag bags containing a bottle of vodka with an IPA label and their hard copy newsletter.

- Always download the blank Travel Form to your computer. Never complete the online form
- Complete a separate Travel Form for each country you plan to visit.
- If you plan to visit more than one location/city or town, use page two of the form.
- If you have insufficient space of the form to describe activities you would like to do or places you would like to visit, attach a separate page in Word format.
- Allow sufficient time: For group travel, submit your form(s) at least 3 months in advance and 1 month in advance of individual/family travel.

Why are there so few items for sale?

The most direct answer is Money! Being a relatively new Region, we do not have the financial resources to purchase and maintain in stock a large selection of items which conceivably could sit around for years. To compensate for our limited buying power, we use a purchase on demand system whereby members are asked to place orders in advance of placing an order with a manufacturer. In this manner we are assured to recover expenditures. Some items, like those shown below, are high demand items for travelers who use these items as tokens of their appreciation for favours rendered while travelling.

Special Orders

About twice a year, orders are solicited for items such as t-shirts and polo style shirts. These are 'purchase on demand' items and a minimum number of orders are required before an order can be placed. As each manufacturer we deal with requires a minimum order to ensure a reasonable price for members, an order will not be placed until we meet the threshold.

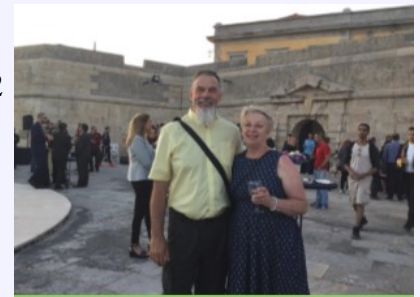

Brief History of the Former Region 6 Ottawa / Carleton

Prologue

Unfortunately, not much is known about the former Region 6 Ottawa/Carleton. What we do know comes from four pages of abbreviated notes in the form of a “Historian’s Report” and from a personal account by Bill Leverington, Region 6 member, past and present.

Four pages of notes does not seem like much when you consider that the region was in existence for nine years, however, it seems that the Historian only made notes during yearly Annual Meetings or when someone mailed in a report. Yes, you read that last line correctly ‘mailed in’ a report. Nowadays we take email, Facebook, Twitter, etc. for granted but back in the 70s, people usually communicated by letter and only occasionally was the telephone used to make long distance phone calls.

Rather than try and make a story out of the Historian’s Report, it was decided to reproduce the report. When reading the report, the name Charles Wright is mentioned a number of time. Charles Wright, later Rev. Charles Wright, was the founder of Section Canada.

Historian’s Report

June 1972 - Region 6 Ottawa/Carleton was granted regional status. The executive of the day included:

- President—Murray McCallum,
- Vice-President—Robert Kennedy,
- Secretary—Gerald K. Martin,
- Supplies—Art Butroid, and
- Publications—Edward Pendlebury

The region started out with thirty-three (33) members and that number soon climbed to sixty (60) members.

August 1972 - a letter is on file noting communication problems due to the loss of their regional secretary.

March 1973 - there is a note, from Charles Wright, that the meeting to be held in Ottawa was cancelled. It seems that a postal strike caused serious communication problems in that section. Charles stated that the region has serious problems, which he planned to look into.

September 1973 - Lost Regional secretary Syd Facer. At the AGM, it was stated that there were some problems with loss of direction and confusion but that efforts were being made to form a new executive, and to promote IPA in an effort to increase membership and revitalize the region. Charles Wright noted that Facer seemed to be the only one in the area who was holding that region together. Lastly, it was stated, that Bill Leverington, formerly of R1 (London, Ontario), was now in the R6 area and was starting efforts to put R6 back together again.

August 1974 - Murray McCallum of R6 said that he hoped that R6 would become more involved with planning events such as the AGM in the future. At this time there were 24 original members (paid up). Phillips (R7) stated that he was in constant communication with R6 and noted that R6 was active again under new leadership.

September 1975 - R6 not represented at the AGM. Phillips reported that he had visited R6 to attempt to motivate them and he found that there seemed to be some personality problems there.

July 1976 - Only two Executive Committee members shown:

- President - Murray McCallum, and
- Treasurer Bill Leverington

1977 - New Executive Committee

- President—Wayne Plumb
- Vice President - George Down
- Secretary—James Bayne
- Treasurer—Bill Leverington
- Supply Officer—Andre Boucher
- Social Director—Murray McCallum

1977 AGM - Was hosted successfully by R6. President Wayne Plumb stated that the members rallied to host the meeting and would be embarking on a recruiting campaign in the near future. He felt that hosting the AGM would assist the region in gaining members for the future.

June 1979 - New Executive:

- President - Bill Leverington
- Vice President & Secretary - James Bayne
- Registrar/Secretary - Tom Dunlevie
- Editor for region - Bill Leverington
- Treasurer & Social Secretary - Richard Copithorn
- Supply Officer - Andre Boucher

November 1979 - reference made to problems in R6 again.

April 1980 - National Treasurer reported that R6 was two years delinquent with its dues and recommended that a notice of dissolution should be made if that region did not pay its national dues and become active again within one year. a letter was written to the President of R6 offering every assistance from NEC to put the region back into action and stating that they wanted them to continue as a region. A request was made for some indication of reactivation within the next year.

May 1980 - R6 not represented at NEC or AGM meeting. Charles Wright reported that nothing had been officially received from R6 for some time and noted that various problems had occurred with the region. He noted that the work of both Phillips and Courval to resolve the problems met with little of no cooperation from the region. Leverington who had been very active as an IPA member had relinquished his post due to family problems and Jim Bayne had taken over but had been too ill to do a very effective job. This matter had been discussed at the last NEC meeting in Kingston. It was suggested that some action should be taken to resolve this difficult situation and it was noted that the R6 was 2 years in arrears for dues and would not respond to letters on the subject. Members were asked if there was any objection to the idea of R2 attempting to get R6 moving or to R2 inviting R6 members to join with R2. It was stated that R7 should do the same due to the geographical location of R6. It was decided that the matter should be left to NEC Officers to deal with.

Brief History of the Former Region 6 Ottawa / Carleton - Cont'd

Historian's Chronological Report—cont'd

May 1981 - Constitution amended to include Expulsion & Dissolution of a section. Reference was made to the problems encountered with R6 over nonpayment of national dues. There was nothing in the constitution in place to deal with this issue. It was decided that, in the event of the dissolution of the Canadian Section of the International Police Association the disposition of the assets of the section shall be decided by the Extra-ordinary Annual General Meeting. Expulsion shall be pronounced by the combined National Executive Council and Regional representatives, at an Annual General Meeting. after a further period of one year, upon application being made to the Annual General Meeting by the National Treasurer.

Secretary General's Report - May 1981

He received a letter from Bill Leverington of R6 stating the R6 should be considered "down and out" and cited the reason that Jim Bayne, the Regional Secretary was back in hospital and non-functioning. and his own son was having serious medical problems, He was unable to put any efforts into the IPA and region's response to the national section has been negligible. No one else was willing to take over and very few members renewed their membership. He requested that the books be closed, all funds placed in one account and he had instructed his treasurer to await further instructions. He was asking for advice and guidelines on how to proceed and he thought that his current membership would re-join R 1 as members.

He apologized for the lack of response from his area and hoped that they would understand his problems. He hoped that the region could be re-activated some time in the future.

The funds had been put into a trust account in the name of IPA and that some efforts would be made by the NEC to get them going again.

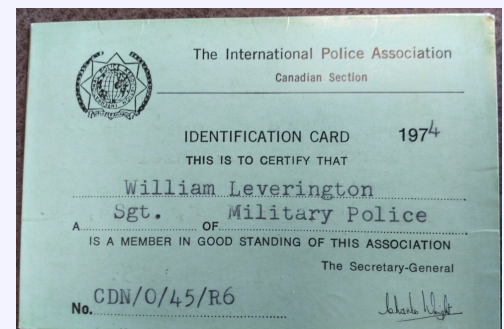
It was felt that it would not be a good idea to transfer membership to other regions because there was a possibility that another region was being stated in Kingston, not far from Ottawa. Discussions were to continue about having members transfer to Kingston and have the funds from Ottawa transferred to Kingston to help them startup.

NOTE: As part of our brief history, Bill Leverington, former Region 6 President, was asked to write a few notes based on what he remembers about the former Region 6 Ottawa/Carleton. Like many people in Eastern Ontario, Bill was unaware that Region 6 was reconstituted and when he learned it was, he rejoined in April 2017 - 36 years after he had no choice but to request Region 6 be closed down.

Bill's Comments

“ In 1972, being employed as a Military Police in London, Ontario, I learned about and was accepted into the International Police Association Region One.

In 1973, I was posted to Ottawa and transferred my membership to Region Six. With a little financial knowledge and the Treasurer position was empty, I took on that position. As being the only Military Policeman member in R6, I had contacts with several police forces in the area. Although I was able to recruit several members of the Military, I and others were unable to convince police members of other Forces, to join. There were many reasons given: ie. Force policy, dislike of some other forces, dislike of some members. I could go on but I will not.



Brief History of the Former Region 6 Ottawa / Carleton - Cont'd

Of the Military members, I seem to recall about 10, within 2-3 years, they were moved out of Ottawa, One, to Saskatchewan, One to BC, the rest to Germany.

In 1977, Region Six was asked to host the AGM. We, the members did a lot of work to ensure it went well. The Hotel used was on Carling and 417. I seem to recall it is no longer a Hotel. However, a small note of appreciation from the Hotel was received due to an incident that occurred after a meeting.

Jim Bayne, I, one for Calgary and two from Toronto were in a room socializing when we heard a crashing noise in the hall, two young boys were smashing the lights in the hall. When they saw us, they started to run. Problem for the boys was the floor hall was a circle. One of our members from Toronto & I went to the left, Jim Bayne and another went to the right, Caught them and turned them over to the Management. The two boys chose the wrong floor to start causing damage.

In 1979, I became the president and tried very hard to get new members, but for the many reasons given above, we could not get any new members and many of the old members stopped renewing their membership. So in 1981, National was informed that region 6 was closing down.

Spam - Emails

Over the last few months, several members have reported receiving email, purportedly from Region 6, Bill Murrell (Regional Supply Officer) or in one case from Harry Summerton (National Travel Secretary). There were three common denominators in all these messages. The first was that the sender(s) seemed to purposely misspell the alleged senders name, the second was that the sender wanted the recipients to open a link contained in the body of the email message, and the third and most alarming is that the sender individually addressed the emails to the correct mailing address making it seem like a legitimate email. Enquiries revealed that other regions are also receiving similar email.
