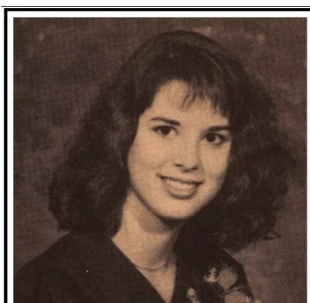
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Membership

In 2019, Region 6 saw an increase of 32 new members which was up one from 2018. So far this year, eight of those members did not renew for 2020 or transferred to another region, Age demographics remained basically the same, despite the rest of you getting older :) 2020 saw a 31% decrease in the number of female members when 6 members decided not to renew for 2020. The number of members still serving also dropped 1 % to 39% of all members are still serving. Currently, IPA Canada has approximately 2,600 members across Canada.

Never Stop Believing - Dreams Can Come True

Tale of an Amazing Interaction Between a Policeman and a Special Needs Person

This is a story about a special needs (down Syndrome) lady named Shoanna Holmes who, at the age of 13 years old developed an imaginary boyfriend, named Clifford who was a policeman. Shoanna was born in the 70s with down syndrome and a bad heart, which the doctors would not operate on. They told us she would have a life expectancy of five years. Through love of family and community Shoanna thrived until 44 years of age when her heart just could not keep up. Shoanna passed away peacefully at home in the arms of her beloved sister this past January 2020. This is her story and tribute to a policeman and Halifax Regional Police Department.

Where Shoanna got the name and character we never knew, but she never wavered in her love and devotion to Clifford. Every time she saw a police car drive past our home she would jump up and get excited, waving frantically. On the occasions when a policeman would have to direct traffic due to a vehicle accident at the intersection by our house Shoanna would literally swoon and watch with adoring eyes.

Everyone that came to visit us, from the milkman, water delivery man, and neighbours received a handmade wedding invitation, even those that were canvassing. Over the years, thousands of people received a wedding invitation as she was always getting married "Next Week". My family bought her wedding dresses which she constantly wore, and we would even rent convertibles to drive her around in.

For her amazing 40th birthday, we rented a stretch limousine and after collecting the senior neighbours went to the Halifax Regional Department in Burnside, NS where it was pre-arranged to have a young constable come out and present her with roses. Shoanna was beyond ecstatic and could not believe she met Clifford on her special day.



Fast forward to her 44th year, when we were advised her internal organs were shutting down. I

took her to the Burnside Police Dept for a tour where all went out of their way to welcome Shoanna and get their picture taken with her. She also received a Halifax Police Dept swag bag, which never left her sight for the remaining months of her life. Shoanna was very thrilled to meet her Clifford again.



On 07 Sep 2019, Shoanna turned 44. Clifford (aka Jim) came for a quick birthday visit with balloons and flowers. The visit only lasted ten minutes as Shoanna exhausted quickly and her heart could not handle excitement. Still, Jim and Joanne (Community Relations Sgt who arranged everything) took the time to come and visit Shoanna.

Her happiness to receive gifts from Clifford was poignant and memorable. Jim also requested Shoanna to put on her wedding dress for him.



Well, Jim most certainly did not have to do this, but I explained the circumstances and he never hesitated. Calling her

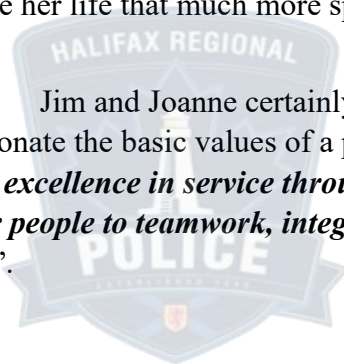
Babycakes (Clifford's name for her) he made a formal request and Shoanna excitedly went to change. She came out of her bedroom glowing like an angel and happily stood beside her Clifford while the cameras were flashing. Numerous poses captured her adoration for Clifford and in her mind she was finally and truly getting married. Jim was so patient and loving towards Shoanna and she just basked and melted in his hands. The pictures, needless to say were jaw dropping amazing and beautiful. Shoanna never hesitated to take pictures, but with Jim in her wedding pictures, her face was so angelic. A true bride.



Shoanna's health quickly deteriorated after her birthday, seemingly as she accomplished her one main, most important facet in her life. She spoke dearly of Clifford and we had the pictures enlarged and plastered around the home. Shoanna's life was complete and she passed away a very happy woman who met and married her one true love.

For another person's compassion to reach out to a special needs like this amazing experience is what life and duty is truly all about. A policeman went above and beyond to spend some time and love of his job to bring sunshine and happiness to a special lady. The Holmes family will forever be in the debt of the Halifax Regional Police Dept for helping Shoanna in her declining health to make her life that much more special.

Jim and Joanne certainly personate the basic values of a policeman. ***"Dedicated to excellence in service through the commitment of our people to teamwork, integrity and our core values"***.

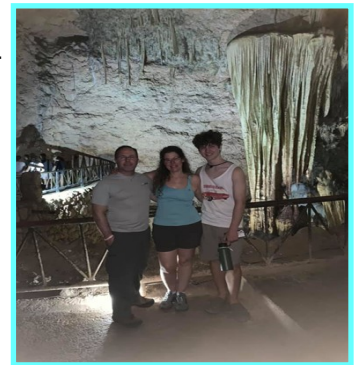

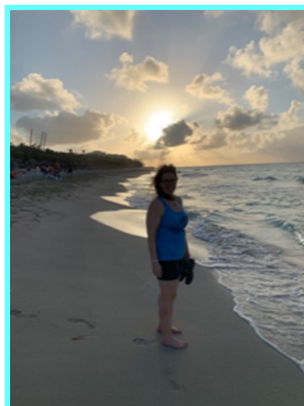

Buenos dias from the IPA House of Málaga which is located in a modern apartment building with an elevator, located within a 5 minute walk to the Paseo Marítimo and the Misericordia beaches. The apt also boasts a swimming pool in the summer season.

The apt has three bedrooms, (two with a double bed and the other with two single beds and a baby crib). The maximum occupancy is six people and also a baby. It has two bathrooms, fully equipped kitchen, laundry room, living room and terrace. It has TV with satellite dish for international channels, heating devices for the winter and ceiling fans and tower fans for the summer, and all necessary appliances including a hair dryer and sound system. The apt also has a garage.

The maximum occupancy are six people. (Three bedrooms, two with a double bed and one with twin beds and a crib for baby).

Pets are not permitted.

The cost varies per season

- a. from October to May (except Easter week): 37 euros a night for two people, increases to 10 euros per night per additional person. Easter week: 52 euros night for two people, increases to 10 euros per night per additional person;
- b. month of June: 42 euros a night for two people, increases to 10 euros per night per additional person;
- c. month of July: 47 euros a night for two people increases to 10 euros per night per additional person;
- d. month of August: 52 euros a night for two people, increase to 10 euros per night per additional person;
- e. 01 – 15 September: 47 euros a night for two people, increase to 10 euros per night per additional person; and
- f. 16 – 30 September: 42 euros night, two people, increase to 10 euros per night per additional person.

Notes

1. Infant to 2 years old are free. Children between 3 – 13 years old pay 7 euros per night.
2. Stays of one or two nights must pay as per month of August fees.
3. Reservations made 3 +months in advance receive a discount of 3% on the total price.
4. Retired IPA members receive a discount of 10% of the total price. (If you book more than 5 nights)

*If you come back, you will have a free night. (It is necessary to reserve five nights. **It does not include the months of July and August and Easter).*

Local Description:

On the beach you can enjoy the restaurants and eat the typical Málaga cuisine, whose main base are the fried fish and skewers. Next to the house has everything necessary supermarket, shops, pharmacy, and ten minutes-walk to the Municipal Market of Huelin. By the seafront, the center is located about 30-40 minutes' walk. And just ten meters from the door of the house is the bus stop (nº 16), which leads to the same center. Málaga capital is the fifth largest city of Spain, located in the south of the Iberian peninsula in a privileged natural enclave. The Mediterranean Sea bathes its coasts and the mounts of Malaga surrounds it forming a mountainous barrier that defends it of the cold.

Malaga is located in southern Spain, on the Costa del Sol (*Coast of the Sun*) on the northern side of the Mediterranean Sea. It lies at the feet of the Montes de Málaga, about 100 kilometres (62 miles) east of the Strait of Gibraltar and about 130 kilometres (81 miles) east of Tarifa (the southernmost point of continental Europe) and about 130 km (81 miles) to the north of Africa.

The climate is subtropical Mediterranean with very mild winters and hot summers. Málaga enjoys plenty of sunshine throughout the year, with an average of about 300 days of sunshine and only about 40-45 with precipitation annually. Its coastal location with winds blowing from the Mediterranean Sea make the heat manageable during the summer.

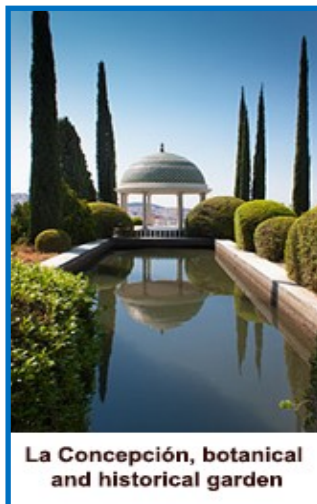
Málaga experiences the warmest winters of any European city. The average temperature during the day in the period from December to February is 17–18 °C (63–64 °F). Generally, the summer season lasts about eight months, from April to November, although in the remaining four months temperatures sometimes surpass 24 °C (75 °F). Its average annual temperature is 23.3 °C (73.9 °F) during the day.

The historical monuments to visit are the Alcazaba, the Gibralfaro Castle, the Cathedral, the Roman Theater, the Customs Palace, the Episcopal Palace, etc. Málaga has become an authentic city of Museums, with a total of 36, most of which are located in its historical center. From Malaga you can take excursions and visit the same day, Granada, Cordoba, Seville, Gibraltar, Ronda, Marbella, etc.

Málaga's history spans about 2,800 years, making it one of the oldest cities in Europe. According to most scholars, it was founded about 770 BC

Málaga is home to many famous people. The painter and sculptor Pablo Picasso; Hebrew poet and Jewish philosopher Solomon Ibn Gabirol; and the actor Antonio Banderas were born here.

The oldest architectural remains in the city are the walls of the Phoenician city, which are visible in the cellar of the Picasso Málaga Museum or Museo Picasso Málaga.





Some sights to see in Málaga are:

- The Roman theatre of Málaga, which dates from the 1st century BC, was rediscovered in 1951.
- The Moors built the Castle of Gibralfaro, which is connected to the Alcazaba, the lower fortress and royal residence. Both were built during the 11th century. The Alcazaba stands on a hill within the city. Originally, it defended the city from the incursions of pirates.
- The Church of Santiago (St James) is an example of Gothic vernacular, incorporating elements from both Christian and Islamic tradition. Also from the period is the *Iglesia del Sagrario*, which was built on the site of the old mosque immediately after the city fell to Christian troops. It boasts a richly ornamented portal in the Isabeline-Gothic style, unique in the city.

Three major events held in the city are:

- the **Holy Week celebration**: Processions start on Palm Sunday and continue until Easter Sunday.
- the **August Málaga Fair** (*Feria de Málaga*): in August, the streets are transformed into traditional symbols of Spanish culture and history, with sweet wine, tapas, and live flamenco shows. The day events consist of dancing, live music (like flamenco or *Verdiales*, traditional music from Málaga) and bullfights at *La Malagueta*, while the night fair is moved to the Recinto Ferial, consisting of restaurants, clubs, and an entire fair ground with rides and games.
- the **Málaga Film Festival**: are the (*Festival de Málaga Cine Español (FMCE)*), dedicated exclusively to films produced in Spain, is one of the most important festivals in the country. It is held annually during a week in March or April.



The Cathedral of the Incarnation

The Cathedral and the Episcopal Palace were planned with Renaissance architectural ideals but there was a shortfall of building funds and they were finished in Baroque style.

Another old catholic building is the Basilica Real Santuario de Santa Maria de la Victoria built in the late 17th century. It has a chapel in which the vertical volume is filled with elaborate Baroque plasterwork.

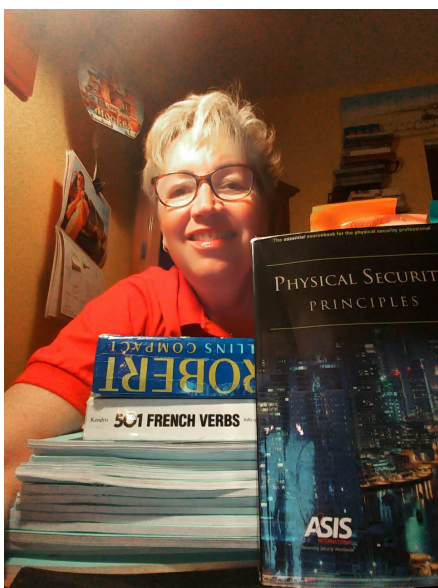

What are the chances they were not allowed out of the house unless they were walking the dog and by complete chance, they just happened to run into their boy/girlfriend along the way? Cute!

As for the adage, misery loves company, this is particularly true in our case. My wife and I are homestay hosts for foreign military officers and NCOs who take a 17-week Language Teacher Training Course in Ottawa. We normally take two students at a time and they become members of the family or in some cases, like an adult child who moved back home.

The latest LTTC course was to run from January to May, however, halfway through the course all the students, except for one, were sent home. The one remaining student, Batbold was told that he could not go home as Mongolia's borders were

closed so now Batbold shares in our misery of captivity. We feel sorry for him as he is a young man with a young family back home and no way to get there.

Here's our student dressed in traditional costume. He brought his ceremonial dress over to



show the other students how Mongolian's typically dress for special occasions. At the rate things are going, I didn't have the heart to tell him he can wear it again this Christmas I Canada.

Overall, I believe we are coping well. My wish is that they get rid of this "wear a mask" requirement and soon!





IPA International Events Cancelled

International Youth Gathering

Disappointment !

The IPA International Youth Gathering (IYG), scheduled for Aug 8th to the 22nd, 2020 has officially been cancelled because of the Coronavirus pandemic. The event was to be hosted by the IPA Czech Republic and IPA Slovakia.

What makes this such a big disappointment is that for the first time, the daughter of one on our members was selected to participate. Daniela, whose mother Nancy is a serving RCMP member was one of three candidates selected by IPA Canada.

When Nancy initially discussed the event with her daughter, Daniela was very excited to apply. That same evening she went to work writing up her essay. When Daniela found out she was selected she yelled "Really? This isn't a joke, right?". She called her grandma, grandpa, aunts, uncles and cousins to share the news. Her school had even run a short announcement in the school's newsletter congratulating her!



Now, like many other IPA members and their families, her trip was suddenly cancelled. While we fell bad for all our members whose trips had to be cancelled, we feel particularly bad for Daniela who missed an opportunity to see other parts of the world and to make new friends.

The IPA Hymn was first played at the 8th IEC held in Toronto, Canada in 1966, where the orchestrations were carried out by the Band of the French National Police under its Deputy Principal Officer, Pierre Bigot. The title of the IPA Hymn is 'Servir par l'Amitié', which translates to the IPA's motto – Service through Friendship.
